**NOTICE OF 43rd ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING**

Notice is hereby given that the 43rd (Forty Third) Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Members of Ginni Filaments Limited will be held on Monday, the 28th Day of September, 2026 at 11:45 A.M. through Video Conferencing ("VC") / Other Audio Visual Means ("OAVM"), without the physical presence of Members at a common venue, to transact the following business:

ORDINARY BUSINESS

1. To receive, consider and adopt the Audited Financial Statements of the Company for the financial year ended on March 31, 2026 including the Audited Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2026 and the statement of Profit and Loss Accounts and Cash Flow for the year ended on that date and the Reports of the Board and the Auditors thereon.
2. To appoint a Director in place of Shri Saket Jaipuria (DIN 02458923) who retires by rotation and being eligible, offers himself for re-appointment.

SPECIAL BUSINESS

3. **Confirmation to hold the office of the Managing Director by Shri Shishir Jaipuria who shall be attaining the age of 70 years on 07/04/2027 during his tenure of 3 years w.e.f. April 01, 2026.**

To consider, and if thought fit, to pass the following resolution, with or without modification(s), as Special Resolution:

"RESOLVED THAT pursuant to the provisions of Section 196, 197 and 203 read with Schedule V and all other applicable provisions, if any, of the Companies Act, 2013, and the Companies (Appointment and Remuneration of Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014 (including any statutory modification(s) or re-enactment thereof for the time being in force) and Regulation 17(6)(e) of SEBI (Listing Obligation and Disclosure Requirements) Regulation, 2015, as amended from time to time and subject to such approvals as may be necessary, the members of the Company at their Annual General Meeting held on 26th September, 2025 has consented to the re-appointment of Shri Shishir Jaipuria (DIN 00274959) as the Managing Director of the Company for a further period of 3 (three) years with effect from April 01, 2026 who shall be attaining the age of 70 years on 7th April, 2027 is authorized and empowered to hold the office of the Managing Director after attaining the age of 70 years on the same terms and conditions and remuneration as the minimum remuneration payable to him in terms of the Special Resolution passed for his appointment as the Managing Director.

"RESOLVED THAT pursuant to the provisions of Section 196, 197 and 203 read with Schedule V and all other applicable provisions, if any, of the Companies Act, 2013, and the Companies (Appointment and Remuneration of Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014 (including any statutory modification(s) or re-enactment thereof for the time being in force) and subject to such further approvals as may be necessary, consent of the members of the Company be and is hereby accorded to the re-appointment of Mr. Suresh Singhvi (DIN No. 00293272) aged 72 years as Whole-time Director designated as Director (Finance) & CFO of the Company for a period of 1 (one) year with effect from 1st August, 2026 on a remuneration as the minimum remuneration payable to him, irrespective of inadequacy or in absence of profits and on the terms and conditions as set out in the Statement annexed to the Notice of AGM with liberty to the Board of Directors (hereinafter referred to as "Board" which term shall be deemed to include the Nomination and Remuneration Committee constituted by the Board) to alter and vary the terms and conditions of the said reappointment in such form and manner or with such modifications as the Board may deem fit and agreed to by Mr. Suresh Singhvi.

1. The Government of India through Ministry of Corporate Affairs has allowed conducting Annual General Meeting through Video Conferencing (VC) or Other Audio Visual Means (OAVM) and dispensed with the personal presence of the members at the meeting. Accordingly, the Ministry of Corporate Affairs issued Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020 and Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020 and Circular No. 02/2021 dated January 13, 2021 and Circular No. 21/2021 dated December 14, 2021 and Circular No. 02/2022 dated May 05, 2022, Circular No. 10/2022 dated December 28, 2022, Circular No. 09/2023 dated September 25, 2023, Circular No. 09/2024 dated September 19, 2024 and latest being Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025 ("MCA Circulars") and Circular no. SEBI/HO/ CFD/CMD1/CIR/P/2020/79 dated May 12, 2020 Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD2/CIR/P/2021/11 dated January 15, 2021, Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD2/CIR/P/2022/62 dated May 13, 2022, SEBI/ HO/CRD/PoD-2/P/CIR/2023/4 dated January 05, 2023, Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CFD-PoD-2/P/ CIR/2023/167 dated October 07, 2023 and Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CFD-PoD-2/P/CIR/2024/133 dated October 03, 2024 issued by the Securities Exchange Board of India ("SEBI Circular") prescribing the procedures and manner of conducting the Annual General Meeting through VC/OVAM. In terms of the said circulars, the 43rd Annual General Meeting ("AGM") of the Members will be held through VC/OAVM. Hence, Members can attend and participate in the AGM through VC/ OAVM only. The detailed procedure for participation in the meeting through VC/OAVM is as per note(s) and available at the Company's website www.ginnifilaments.com . Additionally, in accordance with Regulation 36(1)(b) of the SEBI Listing Regulations, as amended from time to time, a letter containing the web-link, including the exact path, where complete details of the Integrated Annual Report is available, is being sent to all the Shareholders who have not registered their Email IDs with the Company/Depositories/Skyline Financial Services Pvt. Ltd., Registrar and Share Transfer Agent (RTA) of the Company.
2. The relevant Explanatory Statement pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 ("Act") setting out material facts concerning the business under Item Nos. 3 and 4 of the Notice, is annexed hereto. The relevant details, pursuant to Regulations 36 of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI Listing Regulations") and Secretarial Standard on General Meetings issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India, in respect of Directors seeking appointment/ re-appointment at this Annual General Meeting ("AGM") is also annexed.
3. Pursuant to the Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020 issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, the AGM is being conducted through VC/OAVM, the Proxy Form and the Attendance Slip are not required to be annexed to this Notice.
4. Institutional/Corporate members intending to attend the AGM through authorised representatives are requested to send a scanned copy of duly certified copy of the board or governing body resolution authorising the representatives to attend and vote at the Annual General Meeting through VC/OAVM. The said Resolution/ Authorization shall be sent to the Scrutinizer by email through its registered email address to jatinfcs@gmail.com with a copy marked to secretarial@ginnifilaments.com .
5. The register of members and share transfer books of the Company shall remain closed from **22/09/2026 to 28/09/2026** (both days inclusive) for the purpose of Annual General Meeting.
6. Members are requested to intimate changes, if any, pertaining to their name, postal address, email address, telephone/mobile numbers, Permanent Account Number (PAN), mandates, nominations, power of attorney, bank details such as, name of the bank and branch details, bank account number, MICR code, IFSC code, etc., to their DPs in case the shares are held in electronic form and to Registrar and Transfer Agent (RTA) Skyline Financial Services Pvt. Ltd. at D-153/A, 1st Floor, Phase-I, Okhla Industrial Area, New Delhi-110020 in case the shares are held in physical form.
7. Members holding shares in dematerialised mode are requested to register/ update their email addresses/Electronic Bank Mandate by contacting their respective Depository Participants.
8. Members holding shares in physical form can avail of the nomination facility by filing Form SH-13 with the Company or its Registrar and Transfer Agent of the Company viz. M/s Skyline Financial Services Pvt. Ltd. at D-153/A, 1st Floor, Phase-I, Okhla Industrial Area, New Delhi-110020. Members holding shares in electronic mode, may approach their respective Depository Participant for availing the nomination facility.
9. Members who are holding shares in physical form in identical names in more than one folio are requested to write to RTA enclosing their Share Certificate(s) to enable the Company to consolidate their holding into one folio.



10. In case of joint Members attending the AGM, only such joint holder who is higher in the order of names will be entitled to e-vote.
11. As per Regulation 40 of SEBI Listing Regulations, as amended, securities of listed companies can be transferred only in dematerialized form with effect from April 1, 2019. Further, requests for transmission or transposition of securities, whether held in physical or dematerialised form, shall be effected only in dematerialised form.

In view of the above and to avail the benefits of dematerialisation and ease portfolio management, Members are requested to consider and dematerialise shares held by them in physical form.

12. Transfer of securities in physical mode was discontinued w.e.f. April 01, 2019 and transfer deeds which were rejected/returned due to deficiency in the documents were allowed to be re-lodged with requisite documents on or before March 31, 2021 as cut-off date for re-lodgement of transfer deeds. Thereafter, SEBI, vide Circular No. HO/38/13/11(2)2026-MIRSD-POD/II/3750/2026 dated January 30, 2026, has opened a special window for transfer and dematerialisation of physical securities sold/purchased pursuant to transfer deeds executed prior to April 1, 2019. The special window shall remain open for a period of one year, from February 5, 2026 to February 4, 2027, and shall cover both fresh lodgement of eligible transfer requests as well as re-lodgement of transfer requests that were earlier rejected, returned or not attended to due to deficiencies in documents, process or otherwise, subject to the conditions prescribed in the Circular.

In Compliance with the aforesaid MCA Circulars and SEBI Circular dated 07/10/2023, this Notice along with explanatory statement, inter-alia explaining the manner of attending this AGM through VC/OAVM and the instructions for electronic voting (e-voting), along with the Annual Report for the FY 2025-26 is being sent only through electronic mode to those members whose e-mail addresses are registered with the Company/Depositories. Members may note that the Notice and Annual Report will also be available on Company's website (www.ginnifilaments.com), Stock Exchange's website (www.nseindia.com) and CDSL website (www.evotingindia.com). Any Member/s requiring the hard copy of Annual Report may kindly send an email from the registered email id at or send a duly signed request in original at the registered office of the Company mentioned above.
17. Pursuant to Sections 101 and 136 of the Act read with relevant Rules made thereunder, Companies can serve Annual Reports and other communications through electronic mode to those Members who have registered their e-mail address either with the Company or with the Depository Participants ('DP'). Members, who have not registered their e-mail address with the Company or with their respective depository and wish to receive the Notice of the 43rd AGM and the Annual Report, can now register/update their E-mail address with RTA at the following link : <http://skylinerta.com/EmailReg.php> or send scanned copy of a duly signed

20. Members attending the AGM through VC / OAVM shall be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Act.
21. Since the AGM will be held through VC/OAVM without the physical presence of Members at a common venue, the route map is not required to be annexed.
22. The voting rights of shareholders shall be in proportion to their shares of the paid up equity shares capital of the Company.
23. The Company has appointed Mr. Jatin Gupta of M/s Jatin Gupta & Associates, Practicing Company Secretary, to act as the Scrutinizer to scrutinise the voting during the AGM and remote e-voting process in a fair and transparent manner and he has given his consent for the same.
24. Scrutinizer will submit his report to the Chairman of the Company or to any other person authorized by the Chairman after the completion of the scrutiny of the e-voting (votes cast during the AGM and votes cast through remote e-voting), not later than 48 hours from the conclusion of the AGM. The result declared along with the Scrutinizer's report shall be communicated to the stock exchanges, NSDL in accordance with the SEBI Listing Regulations and additionally be uploaded on the Company's website at www.ginnifilaments.com and on the website of CDSL at www.evotingindia.com.
25. Members are requested to note that SEBI had issued various circulars and master circulars for common & simplified norms for processing service requests from the shareholders/investors including mandatory furnishing of PAN, KYC and nomination details etc. The Company has from time to time sent communication to concerned shareholders requesting them to update their PAN, KYC, nomination, bank details and contact details so as to render prompt service to them. The Company has sent latest communication on 20th June, 2026 to the concerned shareholders requesting them to update their details.

26. Voting

All persons whose names are recorded in the Register of Members or in the Register of Beneficial Owners maintained by the Depositories as on the cut-off date namely 21/09/2026 only shall be entitled to vote at the General Meeting by availing the facility of remote e-voting or by voting at the General Meeting.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING THE AGM ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- a) As you are aware, in view of the situation arising due to COVID-19 global pandemic, the general meetings of the companies shall be conducted as per the guidelines issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) vide Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020, Circular No.17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020 and Circular No. 09/2023 dated 25/09/2023 and Circular No. 09/2024 dated September 19, 2024 and latest being Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025. The forthcoming AGM/ will thus be held through through video conferencing (VC) or other audio visual means (OAVM). Hence, Members can attend and participate in the ensuing AGM through VC/OAVM.



- b) Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended), and MCA Circulars dated April 08, 2020, April 13, 2020 and May 05, 2020 the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM/. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized e-Voting's agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting as well as the e-voting system on the date of the AGM will be provided by CDSL.
- c) The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode within 30 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available to at least 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
- d) The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of ascertaining the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
- e) Pursuant to MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, the facility to appoint proxy to attend and cast vote for the members is not available for this AGM. However, in pursuance of Section 112 and Section 113 of the Companies Act, 2013, representatives of the members such as the President of India or the Governor of a State or body corporate can attend the AGM through VC/OAVM and cast their votes through e-voting.
- f) In line with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, the Notice calling the AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.ginnifilaments.com. The Notice can also be accessed from the websites of the National Stock Exchange of India Limited at www.nseindia.com. The AGM Notice is also disseminated on the website of CDSL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility and e-voting system during the AGM) i.e. www.evotingindia.com.
- g) The AGM has been convened through VC/OAVM in compliance with applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 read with MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, MCA Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 09/2023 dated 25/09/2023 and Circular No. 09/2024 dated September 19, 2024 and latest being Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025.
- h) In continuation to this Ministry's General Circular No. 20/2020 dated 05.05.2020, General Circular No. 02/2022 dated 05.05.2022, General Circular No. 10/2022 dated 28.12.2022 and General Circular No. 09/2023 dated 25/09/2023 and Circular No. 09/2024 dated September 19, 2024 and latest being Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025 and after due examination, it has been clarified by the MCA to allow companies to conduct their AGMs through VC or OAVM, till further orders, in accordance with the requirements provided in paragraphs 3 and 4 of the General Circular No. 20/2020 as per MCA dated May 05, 2020.

THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETINGS ARE AS UNDER:

Step 1: Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2: Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.

- (i) The voting period begins on **25.09.2026 at 09:00 a.m.** and ends on **27.09.2026 at 05:00 p.m.** During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date (record date) of **21st September, 2026** may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to



provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

Step 1. Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

- (iv) In terms of SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

Pursuant to abovesaid SEBI Circular, Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meetings for **Individual shareholders holding securities in Demat mode CDSL/NSDL is given below:**

After successful authentication, user will be able to see the e-Voting option where the evoting is in progress and also able to directly access the system of all e-Voting Service Providers.

The Board of Directors of the Company at its meeting held on 05th August, 2025 has reappointed Shri Shishir Jaipuria as Managing Director of the Company for a further period 3 years w.e.f. 1st April, 2026 on remuneration as recommended by the Nomination and Remuneration Committee (NRC). Further, his appointment was approved by the shareholders by passing special resolution in AGM held on 26th September, 2025.



The Independent Directors namely Shri Manish Agrawal, Shri Kalpataru Tripathy, Smt. **MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS**

The Management of the Company is pleased to present its Report on the industry scenario, including the Company's performance during the financial year 2025–26.

During the year under review, the Company has taken a strategic decision to close the operations of its Garment Division located at D-196, Sector-63, Noida – 201 307 (U.P.), with effect from June 30, 2025. This step has been undertaken to streamline operations and improve overall efficiency.

The Company had previously transferred its loss making yarn and knit fabric undertaking in the year 2024 -2025 and has closed its loss making Garment unit in the current financial year with a view to continue its focus on its core business segments, including the non-woven and consumer product divisions, with an objective to enhance value for all stakeholders.

The management of Ginni Filaments Limited has provided an analysis of the Company's division-wise performance and key business updates for the financial year ended March 31, 2026, along with its outlook for the future. The outlook is based on the current economic environment; however, it may be influenced by global socio-economic and political developments.

1. Industry Structure and Developments**Nonwoven Division & Consumer Product Division**

Forecasts for spunlace nonwovens indicate healthy growth in the years ahead. According to market analyst Smithers, compound annual growth rates for the 2025-2030 period are projected at 8.8% in tons, 9.8% in square meters and 9.5% in market value. Notably, spunlace is the fastest-growing nonwovens process in the 2020-2030 period.

Globally spunlace non-woven is widely used in wipes, surgical draps, gowns and wound dressing. This segment provides major consumption of spunlace. With crosslapping and further coating/laminating spunlace provide further areas of growth such as filtration, automotive PVC/Leather etc.

The global FMCG landscape for wet wipes and cosmetic products (skincare, beauty care, hygiene, and personal care) is expected to witness steady but structurally transformative growth between 2026 and 2031. Wet wipes, once convenience-driven, are now embedded as essential hygiene products, with the global market projected to expand steadily (approx. 2.7–3.8% CAGR) driven by rising hygiene awareness, urban lifestyles, and demand for portable solutions. Simultaneously, personal care wipes alone are growing faster (~6% CAGR) reflecting premiumization and multi-use adoption across baby care, intimate hygiene, and facial cleansing. The adjacent cosmetics segment is being reshaped by “clean beauty,” dermatological safety, and wellness-led consumption, with consumers prioritizing natural, organic, and skin-sensitive formulations over purely aesthetic appeal.

A defining global trend for 2026–2031 is sustainability-led innovation. Regulatory pressure and consumer awareness around plastic waste and microfibers are pushing manufacturers toward biodegradable, compostable, and plant-based substrates. At the same time, product differentiation is shifting toward functional benefits—antibacterial, dermatologically tested, and multi-purpose wipes—along with premium skincare formats such as infused wipes and hybrid products that replace traditional cleansing routines. Digital commerce and influencer-led discovery are accelerating adoption, particularly in emerging markets where online channels are driving product trials and brand switching. However, risks remain in the form of regulatory tightening (especially on disposables), raw material volatility (nonwoven fabrics, chemicals), and consumer backlash against non-eco-friendly products.

India represents a high-growth, underpenetrated opportunity within this global context. The wet wipes market alone is expected to grow at ~6.4% CAGR to reach over USD 3.4 billion by 2030 market value [**Grand view Research**], supported by rising disposable incomes, urbanization, and increasing hygiene awareness. The broader personal care wipes segment is similarly expanding, with strong traction in baby care, intimate hygiene, and cosmetic wipes, alongside a surge in domestic startups offering natural and affordable alternatives. In parallel, India's beauty and personal care market is evolving rapidly—projected to reach ~\$27 billion by 2029—driven by a young population, digital penetration, and growing demand for Ayurveda-inspired and clean-label products. Tier 2 and Tier 3 cities, along with e-commerce penetration, are expected to be the next major growth engines.

2. Opportunities and Threats

India's domestic market for spunlace fabric is also improving having growth rate of about 15% due to increasing of disposable income and because of hygiene consideration, particularly by young population of India.



For Ginni Filaments Ltd., the opportunity lies in leveraging its core competency in nonwoven fabrics to move up the value chain into branded or private-label FMCG products, especially in sustainable wipes and dermo-cosmetic applications. The company targeted through backward integration, export potential, and OEM partnerships with global brands. However, strategic risks include margin pressures from commoditization, the need for strong branding capabilities (well taken and progressing on that direction), and increasing ESG compliance costs. Success in this sector will depend on innovation in eco-friendly materials, strategic brand positioning (or B2B partnerships), and the ability to align with evolving consumer expectations around safety, sustainability, and convenience”

3. Segment-wise or product-wise performance

The Non-Woven as well as Consumer Product Division of the Company has shown improvement both in terms of top line and margins. Closure of Garment units has improved the overall performance of the Company.

4. Internal Control System and their adequacy

The company has Internal Control System commensurate with the size, scale and complexity of its operations. The framework has been designed to provide reasonable assurance with respect to recording and providing reliable financial and operational information, complying with applicable laws, safeguarding assets from unauthorized use, executing transaction with proper authorization and ensuring compliance with corporate policies. The controls, based on the prevailing business conditions and processes have been tested during the year and no reportable material weakness in the design or effectiveness was observed.

The scope and authority of the Internal Audit function is defined in the Internal Audit Charter. To maintain its objectivity and independence, the Internal Audit Function Report to The Chairman of the Audit Committee. The Internal Audit team develop an annual audit plan based on the risk profile of the business activities. The Internal Audit plan is approved by the Audit Committee, which also reviews compliance to the plan.

The Internal Audit team monitors and evaluates the efficiency and adequacy of internal control system in the Company, its compliance with operating system, accounting procedures and policies at all location of the Company and its subsidiaries. Based on the report of internal audit function, process owners undertake corrective action(s) in their respective area(s) and thereby strengthen the control. Significant audit observations and corrective action(s) thereon are presented to the Audit Committee.

The use of SAP platform and internal audits by independent Chartered Accountant firm with vast experience and knowledge further strengthen the internal control system.

5. Risk, Concerns and Outlook

The Non – Woven segment consisting of all varieties of non- wovens is growing by 8 to 9% per annum and the Spunlace non –woven comprise about 12% of the total non-woven and this is likely to reach 14% of the total non-woven by 2028 .

Global spunlace market is highly competitive, with strong pressure on standard grades due to broad capacity availability in many regions. At the same time, demand continues to shift toward higher-performance and more specialized nonwovens, especially where customers need consistent technical properties, premium feel and reliable supply. “Overall, the growth outlook is positive, but success increasingly depends on differentiation, quality stability and application-focused product design.

This will provide new opportunities to use of cross lapper and coated spunlace in these area. The same aspect is in consideration of Ginni Filaments Ltd.

However, recent issue of trade tariff imposition by U.S and the war situation in Middle East has also created risks for entire global which is to be watched closely.

6. Financial performance with respect to operational performance.

**Notes forming part of financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026****Note – 1 – Company overview**

Ginni Filaments Ltd. is a public limited company and it has been engaged primarily in the business of the manufacturing of textile products like non-woven fabric, wipes and cosmetics at its factories located at Panoli (Gujarat) and Haridwar (Uttarakhand). The shares of the company are listed on NSE.

Note – 2 – Material Accounting Policies**a. Basis of preparation of financial statements**

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as per the Companies (Indian Accounting Standard) Rules, 2015 notified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 as amended and other relevant provisions of the Act. Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use.

The material accounting policy information related to preparation of the financial statements have been discussed in the respective notes.

b. Use of estimate and judgements

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires management to make estimates, judgments and assumptions. These estimates, judgments and assumptions affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Accounting estimates could change from period to period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Appropriate changes in estimates are made as management becomes aware of changes in circumstances surrounding the estimates. Changes in estimates are reflected in the financial statements in the period in which changes are made. Differences between actual results and estimates are recognised in the period in which the results are known/ materialised.

c. Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised at the transaction price of the goods sold or service rendered. The amount disclosed as revenue is net of return and variable consideration on account of various discounts and schemes offered by the company.

The company recognizes revenue when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably and it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the entity.

(i) Sales of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods are transferred to the buyer and the entity retains neither continuing managerial involvement to the degree usually associated with ownership nor effective control over the goods sold.

The performance obligation in case of sales of goods is satisfied at a point in time i.e. Revenue from export sales is recognized when the material is shipped to the customer while Domestic sales is recognized on the basis of ex-factory dispatch as may be specified in the contract.

(ii) Export Incentives

Export benefits/incentives are accounted for on accrual basis.

(iii) Exceptional Items

When items of income and expenses within statement of Profit and loss from ordinary activities are of such size, nature or incidence that their disclosure is relevant to explain the performance of the enterprises for the period, the nature and amount of such material items are disclosed separately as exceptional items.

**d. Employee benefits****(i) Short term Employee Benefits**

Short Term Employee Benefits are recognized as an expense on an undiscounted basis in the statement of profit and loss of the year in which the related service is rendered.

(ii) Post Employment Benefits**(a) Defined Contribution Plans****Provident Fund**

Retirement benefit in the form of provident fund is a defined contribution scheme. The Company has no obligation, other than the contribution payable to the provident fund. The Company recognizes contribution payable to the provident fund scheme as an expense, when an employee renders the related service.

(b) Defined benefit plans**Gratuity**

Liabilities with regard to the Gratuity Plan are determined by actuarial valuation, performed by an independent actuary, at each balance sheet date using the projected unit credit method. The Company recognizes the net obligation of a defined benefit plan in its balance sheet as an asset or liability. Remeasurements comprising of actuarial gains and losses, on the net defined benefit liability are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income which are not reclassified to profit or loss in subsequent periods.

Compensated Absences

The liability with regard to accumulated compensated absences is determined by actuarial valuation, performed by an independent actuary at each balance sheet date using projected unit credit method. The Company recognizes the net obligation of a defined benefit plan in its balance sheet as an asset or liability. Remeasurements are recognised in statement of profit & loss in the period in which they arise.

e. Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation / impairment loss, if any. Cost includes freight, duties, taxes, and other incidental expenses. Pre-operative expenses including eligible borrowing cost incurred during construction period are charged to Capital Work-in-Progress and on completion, the cost is allocated to the respective property, plant and equipment. Machinery spares which are specific to a particular item of the property, plant and equipment and if their use is expected to be irregular are capitalized as applicable.

f. Intangible assets

Intangible assets are stated at cost less accumulated amount of amortization. Intangible assets are amortized over their respective individual estimated useful lives on a straight-line basis, from the date that they are available for use.

g. Depreciation and amortisation expenses

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment is provided on straight line method at the rate and in the manner prescribed in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013, w.e.f. 1st April, 2014 except in case of continuous Process plant. The depreciation on continuous Process Plant has been provided as per useful life technically evaluated by chartered engineer. Cost of leasehold land is amortized over the period of lease.

The Company has applied for the one-time transition exemption of considering the carrying cost on the transition date i.e. April 1, 2016 as the deemed cost under IND AS and hence regarded thereafter as historical cost.

Raw materials, stores and spares are valued at lower of cost and net realizable value.

Work in progress and finished goods, stock in trade and stock in transit are valued at lower of cost and net realizable value. The costs of work in progress and finished goods include costs of raw material, conversion cost and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Waste is valued at net realizable value.

Cost of inventories is computed on weighted average.

i. Borrowing costs

Borrowing cost attributable to acquisition and construction of qualifying assets are capitalized as a part of the cost of such asset up to the date when such asset is ready for its intended use. Other borrowing costs are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss Account.

j. Income taxes

Income tax expense represents the sum of current and deferred tax (including MAT). Tax is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised directly in equity or other comprehensive income, in such cases the tax is also recognised directly in equity or in other comprehensive income.

Current tax is measured at the amount of tax expected to be payable on the taxable income for the year as determined in accordance with provision of Income tax Act, 1961

Deferred tax is recognised on differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the Balance sheet and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit and are accounted for using the balance sheet approach. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences, and deferred tax assets are generally recognized for all deductible temporary differences, carry forward tax losses and allowances to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences, carry forward tax losses and allowances can be utilised. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the applicable tax rates. Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are off set and presented as net.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each balance sheet date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilised.

Credit of MAT is recognised as an asset only when and to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period, i.e., the period for which MAT credit is allowed to be carried forward. In the year in which the MAT credit becomes eligible to be recognized as an asset, the said asset is created by way of a credit to the profit and loss account and shown as MAT credit entitlement. The Company reviews the same at each balance sheet date and writes down the carrying amount of MAT credit entitlement to the extent there is no longer convincing evidence to the effect that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period.

k. Earnings per share

Basic earnings per equity share is computed by dividing the net profit attributable to the equity holders of the company by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period. Diluted earnings per equity share is computed by dividing the net profit attributable to the equity holders of the company by the weighted average number of equity shares considered for deriving basic earnings per equity share and also the weighted average number of equity shares that could have been issued upon conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares. The dilutive potential equity shares are adjusted for the proceeds receivable had the equity shares been actually issued at fair value.

l. Foreign Currency Transactions

The functional currency of the company is Indian rupee. These financial statements are presented in Indian rupee.

In preparing the financial statements, transaction in foreign currencies are recognised at the rates of exchange prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Exchange differences arising on foreign exchange transactions settled during the period are

recognised in the Statement of profit & loss of the period.

The foreign currency monetary items are translated using the closing rate at the end of each reporting period. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency shall be translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction. Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items or on translating monetary items at rates different from those at which they were translated on initial recognition during the period or in previous financial statements shall be recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. All other foreign exchange gains and losses are presented in the statement of profit and loss on net basis.

m. Cash and cash equivalents

The Cash and cash equivalent in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks and on hand and short-term deposits with a maturity period of three months or less from the balance sheet date, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

n. Provisions and Contingencies

A provision is recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of past event and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made. Information on contingent liability is disclosed in the Notes to the Financial Statements. Contingent assets are not recognised.

o. Leases

Effective April 1, 2019, the Company adopted Ind AS 116 "Leases" and applied the standard to all lease contracts existing on April 1, 2019 using the modified retrospective method on the date of initial application. Consequently, the Company recorded the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments discounted at the incremental borrowing rate and the right of use asset at its carrying amount.

The Company's lease asset classes primarily consist of leases for land and buildings. The Company assesses whether a contract contains a lease, at inception of a contract. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. To assess whether a contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, the Company assesses whether: (i) the contract involves the use of an identified asset (ii) the Company has substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the asset through the period of the lease and (iii) the Company has the right to direct the use of the asset.

The Company recognizes a right-of-use asset ("ROU") and a corresponding lease liability for all lease arrangements in which it is a lessee, except for leases with a term of twelve months or less (short-term leases) and low value leases. For these short-term and low value leases, the Company recognizes the lease payments as an operating expense on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease term and useful life of the underlying asset.

p. Recent accounting pronouncements

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA"), vide notification dated March 10, 2026, issued the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2026, introducing certain amendments to existing Indian Accounting Standards.

The Company has evaluated the impact of the aforesaid amendments on its financial statements and, based on such assessment, has concluded that these amendments do not have any material impact on the financial position, financial performance or cash flows of the Company for the financial year ended March 31, 2026.

(i) General reserve

(iii) Credit risk management

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Company.
